Attend your Plan CCR; check graduation progress, college admission requirements and deadlines. Keep grade up for highest GPA and class rank for college admission and scholarships. Join National Honor Society if qualified Attend "You CAN Pay for College" event. For more info visit www.stepuputah.com Attend Skyridge's Utah College Tour Day on Friday, October 28th ACT Test Date: see www.actstudent.org for test dates and deadlines SAT Test Dates: see www.collegeboard.org for test dates and deadlines Male students must register for selected service on 18th birthday to be eligible for federal financial aid Find out about scholarships and apply for them. Meet with counsel office to verify transcript (after guarter 1 grades post) and complete recommendation letters at least two weeks before due date Apply for admission to various colleges. Find out about college scholarships and apply for them *Attend College Awareness Weeks and apply to colleges during Skytime or Lunch – listen to announcements for what college will be here which day (November 8-11 and 15-18) Regents Scholarship applications available: http://stepuputah.com/regentsscholarship/ (1st deadline Dec 9) Most priority college deadlines: November 1, 2016 or December 1, 2016 APPLY EARLY

Winter:

Take and pass the Civic Test! (found in Skyward)

Priority admission deadline for UofU, SUU, BYU for fall 2016: December 1, 2016

Many out of state colleges have a deadline of November 1, 2016

FAFSA forms are available January 1, 2017

Scholarship priority deadline for Weber State University for fall: January 2017

Send mid-year grade reports to colleges if needed

Academic scholarship deadline for UVU: February 1, 2017

Admission deadline for Dixie: 2 weeks before classes begin

Academic scholarship deadline for Dixie: March 1, 2017

Make sure to apply to more than one college. Choose at least 1 college that you can afford and will accept you

Spring:

Admission deadline for USU and UofU: April 1, 2017 Look for college admission decisions and financial reward letters Visit the college where you have been accepted Apply for other scholarships - research – they are out there Work, fundraise, earn money for college however you can Graduation: May 2017 Complete follow-up paperwork for the college of your choice (scheduling, orientation session, housing arrangements, and other necessary forms)

Summer:

Participate in your college's orientation and registration for classes Send in final transcripts to your college if needed Don't forget Skyridge – We are proud of you whether doing 1,2 or 4 year Higher Ed choice or following an occupational route, mission, military, MATC, peace corps, etc. You did it!



□ Register for the October ACT

This is the last ACT you can take to have your score back by Dec1 = priority admission deadline. Many schools have later admission deadlines. Consider taking the December ACT as well

□ Are you planning on playing sports in college? Are you NCAA qualified? Go to <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> to see if you qualify.

□ Are you planning on serving a religious mission/peace corps, etc. before attending college?

It is recommended that you apply to college now! All the state colleges/universities will defer your admissions and scholarship awards. You will defer at the end of the year, after receiving your mission call.

□ Create an educational resume – Senior Brag Sheet

*include specific details about you, list of awards, recognitions, classes, grades, performances (athletic, creative, or other), and important things about your personality, accomplishments, and character

□ visit <u>www.UtahFutures.org</u> or <u>www.bigfuture.collegeboard.org</u> explore what career would match your profile interests. Good interest inventory!

□ Get on the road and visit some colleges, universities, MATC, and more Narrow your selection to 2-3 final choice – don't rule out prestigious schools because of financial need' any of them offer full need-based scholarships

Letter of recommendations for scholarships Make multiple copies Give your teacher, scout leader, etc. at least two weeks notice Bring the 'senior brag sheet' to help them know of your accomplishments Follow up with a thank you note

□ Prepare any portfolios, audition tapes, writing samples, etc.

If you are planning to apply for talent scholarships, research dates of auditions.

Research the Application & Scholarship Requirements for top 3 school choices

Use the college websites to research all scholarship opportunities and deadlines

- □ TAKE AND PASS the Civics Test found in Skyward

□ Come prepared during COLLEGE AWARENESS WEEK to apply. Bring info sheet and a way to pay application fee

Apply on the school's website Follow all directions and deadlines Pay application fee Have applications completed by priority deadline – December 1st for most schools

□ Request official high school transcripts from the counseling office (after quarter 1 grades have posted)

You will mail these to your perspective colleges Have you received college credit through concurrent enrollment? Send an official college transcript once that credit posts

□ Reserve housing at the school you plan on attending

Discuss finances with parents – what is the plan to pay for college? Is it all your responsibility?

Are your parents planning to pay for part/all of your tuition/housing/food/books/fees

Will you qualify for scholarships? Will you qualify for federal financial aid? (FAFSA) Will you be working while you go to college? How many hours a week?

□ Apply for financial aid (FAFSA) – First day to fill out FAFSA is January 1, 2017

*Use the FAFA4caster to estimate your financial aid

Encourage parents to get tax forms together and get taxes done ASAP

*www.FAFSA.ed.gov – apply online beginning January 1

*Your FAFSA score is also used to see if you qualify for financial need scholarships

Wait for admission and scholarship offers and accept them by the deadline. Keep working in your classes, grades and courses still count! GRADUATE!

ACT/SAT INFORMATION & TEST DATES

ACT/SAT TESTING: Colleges and Universities require an entrance exam for admissions. Registration for testing is done on-line. Taking the ACT or SAT test is dependent on your choice of college. The ACT is more subjectbased and focuses on material students have learned in high school while the SAT is more of an aptitude test that assesses a student's reasoning skills. Utah College and Universities require the ACT

Scholarships/Financial Aid

1) Take the ACT and/or SAT I & II exams. Check <u>www.utahfutures.org</u> or check online to see fi the college of your choice prefers one of these tests to the other

2) Several Utah colleges have priority deadlines and many out-of-state colleges have early

admission deadlines. Make sure to meet these deadlines

- 3) Have your parents check with their employers, credit union, labor unions, civic clubs and other organizations where scholarships may be offered to member's children
- 4) Be aware that students must be admitted to the college befrore scholarships can be awarded
- 5) Campus visist can be set up with schools that interest you. Take advantage of all the great programs colleges have for weekend activities to get a feel for your colleges of interests
- 6) Talent awards in the area of music, dance, theater, and art usually require auditions and portfolios. Check with the high school individual departments and college departments to apply for these scholarships
- 7) Athletic scholarships are handled thorugh NCAA clearinghouse at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> If you have questions check with the Skyridge High Counseling Center
- 8) Financial aid such as grants, loans, and work study programs may be applied for after January 1st. Many scholarships require you to complete the FAFASA form. Visit <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> This is a FREE online application
- 9) Letters of recommendation are required for some scholarships and awards. Please give ample time to complete letters to those you ask. "Requesting a Letter of Recommendation" forms are available in the counseling center. This form can be filled out once and copied.

What is Financial Aid

Tuition and fees are what a school charges you for your education. It may include the cost of computer labs and athletic facilities, but often does not include books or other material you will need. You will need to research the cost of attending college. Financial aid is the money you receive from a variety of sources to cover the cost of your education. More people are eligible for some kind of financial aid. The financial aid sources available to a student attending college in Utah include:

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

<u>Grants</u> – are need-based forms of financial aid that do not have to be repaid

Loans:

A loan is a form of financial aid that must be repaid with interest. The main loan options are student loans, parents loans, and private loans.

Work Study:

Work study provided students with employment opportunities both on and off campus. Participation in a work-study program is typically based on the student's financial need.

Save \$:

The good old fashioned way of paying for college: Work and save your money. Many student work throughout college and make connections, while building a resume

*driver's license #

*social security number (if you don't have one, you can still go to college)

*a way to pay for the admission fee (don't let the cost of the application fee stop you from applying. Some colleges will be waiving their application fee during that week)

Do some research before the week and decide where you are interest in applying and what scholarships you want to apply for.

<u>Student</u> Services
