THE WELLNESS CENTER: A RESOURCE FOR STUDENTS

One of the most important things to tend to in life is one's mental health. It's incredibly difficult to give it your all and get the most out of high school when you're having trouble with mental health. As well as supplying counselors for support, Westlake is proud to provide the Wellness Center: a room dedicated for students to wind down and get assistance. Located in C138, the Wellness Center is available throughout the school day for any students in need.

The Wellness Center provides a quiet, calm environment for students to relax in; calming music plays in the background, comfortable chairs and tables allow students to sit down and take a break, as well as fidgeting toys and stress-releasing items.

Whether they need to get themselves gathered for the day ahead, want to unwind after a long day, or simply need a quick break during class to calm down, the Wellness Center is always open to students.

It does more than provide the space for some private time. Students can also reach out to Janet Harkness, the trained professional who runs the Wellness Center. She's always available to talk with and can help students if they want to discuss topics of any nature.

As well as providing a professional psychiatrist for a consultation, every Wednesday, the Wellness Center hosts a group meeting to discuss various mental wellness topics. All students are invited to join these meetings, and school lunches will be there so students can head straight to the room after their fourth period rather than having to wait in a lunch line first.

I've had the chance to visit the Wellness Center on a few occasions during my time here at Westlake, and I can attest to how well the center works. I was able to join a Wednesday meeting, and even though I wasn't actively participating, I felt my mood improve. I was also able to spend some time talking to Mrs. Harkness with a friend last year, and she was able to help get a situation sorted through. Every part of the Wellness Center is made to help you take care of yourself, and it shows.

For any students who feel like a trip to the Wellness Center will do them good, or want someone to talk with, the Wellness Center is always open. No matter the reason, from serious discussions to just taking five minutes to calm down, the Wellness Center is a valuable resource for all Westlake students. Mental wellness is among the keys to a bright future, and Westlake has invested a lot of time and money into this resource available to all students.

Unknown to many students, Westlake has a functioning food pantry. The food pantry was a project started by Latinos In Action (LIA) last year. The LIA 2020-2021 class put a lot of effort and time into this project, and as the food pantry became more of a reality, more people joined the project. The counseling center helped to identify the needs of the students, the location of the food pantry, the gathering of food, and many other details. The Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) helped to store, maintain, and organize the food. The National Honors Society (NHS), Key Club, and Student Council helped to advertise and gathering food of during the food drive. It was a group effort to create the food pantry.

The food pantry has become a resource to all students in need, organized and managed by student organizations at Westlake. It offers non-perishable food and

hygiene products. The school is working to expanding the hygiene section and add clothing items as well. The pantry is well-stocked with granola bars, snacks, cereals, canned goods, feminine products, deodorant and other necessities... and absurd amounts of mac and cheese.

Donations to the food pantry are always welcome and needed. Throughout the year, students can leave donations at the counseling office or in Mr. Schmolke's room (C246). It will be picked up by a designated student and carried to the food pantry, where it will be cleaned and stored. The organizations running the food pantry may organize a food drive if the pantry is determined understocked. In that case, advertising and posters will help you know where and when to drop off food.

As a Westlake student, the best thing you can do is share and encourage the food pantry. We want students to feel welcome to grab food and ask for help if they need it. The more students spreading the news, the more likely a student in need will hear about it. As a student in need, you can reach out to the counseling center or your teachers. The food pantry is meant to be used, and we encourage students to benefit from this resource.
